

Sharing a Shell Comprehension

First, read the book Sharing a Shell by by Julia Donaldson with your child. After reading, engage them in a conversation using these questions. Make it a natural and enjoyable chat, not an interview.

1. Character and Plot

- Who were the main characters in the book?
- What did the hermit crab, sea anemone, and bristle worm do in the story?
- Which part of the story did you like the most? Why?

2. Understanding

- Why do you think the hermit crab wanted to find a new shell?
- What happened when the hermit crab met the sea anemone and bristle worm?
- How did the characters learn to share the shell?

3. Feelings and Opinions

- How did the book make you feel? Was it heartwarming, funny, or something else?
- Which character did you like the most? Why?
- If you were one of the sea creatures in the story, what would you do?

4. Creativity and Imagination

- Can you think of a new adventure for the hermit crab and his friends? What would they do next?
- How would you change the ending of the story if you could?
- What other sea creatures would you add to the story?

5. Real-World Connections

- Have you ever seen a hermit crab or sea anemone before? Where?
- Do you know any other stories or movies with sea creatures in them?
- What do you think sea creatures do when we're not watching them?

6. Moral and Lessons

- What do you think the characters learned from their adventure?
- Can you think of a lesson or message the story might be trying to tell us?

7. Comparisons and Connections

- How is this story similar or different from other stories you've read about sea creatures?
- Do you think the sea creatures in the book are like real sea creatures? Why or why not?



Activity Ideas

Friendship Storytelling

- Objective: Reinforce the concept of friendship and sharing by creating an original story.
- Materials Needed: Blank paper, crayons/felt-tip pens, glue, old magazines for cutouts, stapler.
- Instructions:
- Brainstorming: Discuss with your child different ways friends can share and help each other. List these ideas.
- Story Creation: Encourage your child to create their own story about two or more friends who learn to share. They can use the list from brainstorming as inspiration.
- Illustration: Have your child illustrate the story using crayons or markers. They can also cut out pictures from magazines to create a collage.
- Assembly: Staple the pages together to make a book.

- Objective: Practice writing and expressing feelings of friendship and gratitude.
- Materials Needed: Construction paper, felt-tip pens, stickers, glue.
- Instructions:
